IINN funds update:

Please note that the April 15 general meeting of Southwest Area Partnership (SWAP) is cancelled due to Governor Holcomb's "Hunker Down Hoosiers" order in response to COVID-19. WWPN has submitted several grant proposals for some of the INN fund money and voting for disbursement of those funds was to happen at the April meeting. SWAP reports that "our 64 excellent proposals for the INN funds have been submitted to CoFW Community Development. When we meet again, each neighborhood will have one person vote on their behalf. If your President is not available to attend that meeting, another person can be designated in writing to Bryan McMillan, Secretary, SWAP." Voting on the fund disbursement will occur at a later date.
